workshop overview

All roads lead to the final mix...every little step in pre production, arrangement, recording and performance meets at the finish line of the final mix. The mix can't really create the intended impact if any of the cogs were deficient, but given the ideal contribution by each of the elements, it can amplify the ingredients to their maximum potential. At the core of mixing are two essential elements of listening and reacting, based off the reaction to listening. It's cyclical, where you, the mix engineer is the first person who gets to "hear" the mix while it's being created. The workshop aims to clarify and stress on this, the key aspect of the mixing process. It is essential that the mix engineer stays true to his / her instinct and mixes with the intent to preserve that instinct.

WHO IS THIS FOR:

Anyone who has ever intended to make a meaningful image out of these elements of the proverbial jigsaw puzzle, this workshop intends to improve that skill. Whether you're a producer looking to make your scratches sound better or a musician looking to make your recordings sound better in the mix, this workshop will help you make better sounding mixes, period.
